Council approves funding

The Choctaw Nation Tribal Council met in Regular Session April 10 to approve additional funding for the 2004 Swine/ Beef Show. The tremendous participation in this year's show increased the cost an extra \$1,892.23 above the original budget. The Council were unanimous in their approval, citing that the students' interest and participation were greatly appreciated.

A budget for "Leadership Through Tradition" camps was approved. Two camps will be held this summer at Jones Academy.

Also approved were funding for Literacy Council; submission of CARES grant application, and continuing the Projects with Industry and a Grant Continuation application for Tribal Victim Assistance Program.

The Tribal Council also voted to place Councilperson Delton Cox in the position of Secretary/Treasurer of the Enterprise Committee, a position previously held by the late Randle Durant.

School programs honored at JOM Banquet

During the annual Oklahoma JOM Conference Banquet March 24 in Tulsa, McAlester Public School's Johnson O'Malley Program was recognized by the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma for its exemplary work with students.

JOM student enrollment at McAlester represents 16% of the total student body. To serve the students at their school they have implemented an academic/cultural enrichment program to provide JOM students the opportunity to become more culturally and educationally aware of their heritage and cultural opportunities.

The tutoring program helps students by providing the appropriate services with emphasis on one-to-one tutoring or small group tutoring.

McAlester's program is aimed at reaching all students within the school system through tutoring, school supplies, cultural presentations, field trips, summer schools, summer camps, educational testing fees and senior recognition.

Head Start student saves lives

Four-year-old Jessica Barnes was awakened at close to 4 o'clock on the morning of March 31 to find the bedroom that she shared with her younger brother, Darren, age two, in flames. She raced into her parents' bedroom and woke her father, telling him that the room was on fire and that he needed to go and get her brother.

Clint and Amanda Barnes quickly went to the bedroom and rescued their son and managed to also save two family pets before their entire house went up in flames. The family lost all of their possessions in the house fire, but because Jessica had visited the fire department on a Head Start field trip with her classmates and teachers, and remembered what they had told her and the others that day, the family got out with no lives lost and no injuries to any of them.

Jessica is a student of the Choctaw Nation Head Start Center in Broken Bow, Oklahoma. Her class had visited the fire department on a field trip earlier



The family of Michael DeWayne Cusher would like to thank everyone who stood beside us throughout Michael's illness and during the loss of Michael. Those hours were the darkest hours





"Since World War I, the Oklahoma National Guard and Native American Tribes of Oklahoma have supported the United States of America in its fight for freedom. Even now, the 120th Engineer Battalion, headquartered in Okmulgee, is deployed

as a part of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Not unlike previous wars and deployments, we have Native Americans proudly serving our Nations and the 120th in this Global War on Terrorism.

"It is my desire to recognize their heritage and service in the 120th Engineers. I feel that it is also important to show the people of Iraq, and the units in our area, the Native American legacy in our unit."

Lt. Col. Bartheld said that their headquarters in Iraq will fly a Choctaw tribal flag to symbolize the unity and presence of tribal members in the 120th Engineers. He ended his letter with this statement, "I would also like for you to know that you have sent the best soldiers I have had the opportunity to serve with in the military. Again, thank you, and God bless."

Exciting things happening for Choctaw Nation



As construction moves along rapidly for the new Choctaw Casino in Durant and the expanded casino in Pocola, improvements are also continuing for the Blue Ribbon Downs race track in Sallisaw. New barns for the horses, renovated clubhouse, new day care and better track surface are among the most noticeable changes that have been made at Blue Ribbon.

New business ventures of the tribe are always exciting, and the horse racing industry is no exception. There are always interesting stories to be told.

I recently received a letter from an acquaintance in Arcadia, California, that updated me on a horse named "Choctaw Nation." This beautiful horse won his first start at Santa Anita. Although the owner, Aase Headley, had tried to enter him in a number of races, there were never adequate entries for the race to actually run. Finally the horse, Choctaw Nation, was entered into a \$40,000 claiming race. This means that he could be bought at the end of the race for that amount.

Choctaw Nation dropped to last in the race, probably 20 lengths behind. According to Headley, he moved up in the middle of the turn and won the race! Because of this amazing performance, he was claimed for the \$40,000. The new owner ran him again three weeks later, with a similar performance, falling far behind, then winning again. Now, the horse is offered for sale at half a million

It is wonderful that people in this industry have opportunities such as this to be successful. I am appreciative that the tribe uses success of businesses to bring new jobs and needed services to our tribal members across the world.

Paul the Apostle instructs Christians to grow up. To the church at Corinth he repeats, "What! know ye not ..."

Today we look at a truth as revealed to us in the fifth chapter of the Gospel of Mark. This chapter deals with the reality of Demon possession.

As an introduction we look at verses 2 and 15: "And when he was come out of the ship, immediately there met him out of the tombs a man with an unclean spirit." Verse 15: "And they come to



Jesus, and see him that was possessed with the devil, and had the legion, sitting, and clothed, and in his right mind; and they were afraid."

These two verses are just a background of one of many instances in the New Testament in which our Lord Jesus encountered men possessed by evil spirits. Now, let us not think that these things happened long ago and are out of date, and do not exist today.

Mark's gospel is the record of the dreadful experience of human beings in the grips of demons. This is something we cannot ignore. It is at the very heart of the message of the Christian faith.

First, let's make a clear distinction between the words "devil" and "demon." The word "devil" is the one word that is used of the one, strange, powerful, spiritual personality called Satan. Satan is a word meaning "adversary." The word "demon" is always used in relation to the evil of an unclean spirit which inhabits human beings.

These demons, before the fall of man described in Genesis, were led in a revolt against God by their leader, Satan - Lucifer, the son of the morning – reference to this is found in Isaiah 14 and Revelation 12, where we are told that no less than one-third of the angels of heaven were involved in the revolt which Satan carried out in his attempt to take over the throne of God. For this revolt, Lucifer and his followers (the angels) were cast out of heaven. It is these "fallen angels" who are

The New Testament reveals the existence of these beings, the access to human people. They are always seeking some material resting place. They could not exist except within human personality or some kind of physical being. And they were always seeking after something or someone through whom they could express their foul, devilish ways - their dirty works. These evil spirits – demons – can create only destruction

Today, we can see these demons operating in the incident which is described for us in Mark chapter 5.

What was the condition of this man? Look at him in verse 2. He was "a man with an unclean spirit." This man's personality was completely controlled with evil spirit. Just as a Christian would claim that his life is "filled - controlled by the Holy Spirit."

First, notice this man's condition in verse 3. He was in a condition of isolation, he "had his dwelling among the tombs," as far away from society as he could get.

Secondly, again in verse 3, and verse 4, he was in a condition of lawlessness. "... No man could bind him, no, not with chains, because he had been often bound with fetters and chains, and the chains had been plucked asunder by him, and the fetters broken in pieces: neither could any man tame him." Nothing could hold him.

Thirdly, this man was in a condition of restlessness in verse 5: "And always night and day, he was in the mountains, and in the tombs, crying ..." Did you ever see a man or woman so restless these days?

Fourthly, this man was in a condition of self-inflicted suffering in verse 5: "... cutting himself with stones."

Then fifthly, he was a danger to society. Matthew 8:28 tells us (though Mark does not record this in exactly the same words): "... he was ... exceeding fierce, so that no man might pass that way."

What a picture of the effect upon a man when he is possessed by an unclean spirit. Is that out of date? Don't you see these symptoms everywhere today? Demon possession is around us – in our time.

Now, notice not only the condition of the man possessed with the evil spirits, but also the character of the demons themselves. The most significant aspect of this whole incident was the attitude of the demons in verses 6 and 7: "But when he saw Jesus afar off, he ran and worshipped him, And cried with a loud voice, and said, What have I to do with thee, Jesus, thou Son of the most high God? ...'

The Devil knows God, and acknowledges the Deity of Jesus Christ. If these evil spirits, demons – unclean spirits, fallen angels – acknowledge Jesus as the Son of God, we might ask ourselves what right have these teachers who deny the Deity of Jesus Christ call themselves Chris-

These unclean spirits spoke through the man, they begged Jesus, that if they were driven out of the man they might enter into a herd of pigs. This reveals their desire for some material influence to satisfy their strange, hellish appetite.

The evil spirits had so possessed the man that he was almost unrecognizable as they held him in their power. He was absolutely helpless. Jesus spoke in verse 8: "... Come out of the man, thou unclean spirit."

That was enough. He did not begin by clothing the man, but by saving him. The only way to get a man out of the slum or skidrow, the gutter of sin, is to get the slum-skidrow, unclean spirit out of the man. Social reform is very good, but the only hope for the human heart is not changed circumstances but a changed heart – a new nature.

In verse 17 the crowd prayed Jesus to depart. They preferred the pigs to the Savior. It is a dreadful thing to tell Jesus to depart. In preferring sin to salvation, that is exactly what you are doing when you listen to the voice that wants to hold you in his grips, instead of listening to the voice of Jesus who says, "Come, take my yoke upon you, learn of me, I will give you rest."

Pray for America. Pray for our service men and women.

Enjoying the family meal

Helping with family meals makes your child feel important in your family. You get time together, too. Your child learns even when tasks aren't perfectly done. So even if you work faster alone, ask your child to help you.

LADDER SAFETY

- Always read the manufacturer's instructions that are with your ladder. It contains the weight the ladder can support and the height you shouldn't exceed, as well as the proper use of the product.
- Inspect the ladder prior to use for malfunctions or possible hazards like a broken rung.
- ➤ Have the right ladder for the job. Overextending the ladder is a definite hazard when it is extended past its intended reach
- ▶ Don't stand on the ladder's bucket stand. It is not a step.
- Check for proper surface, one that is level, firm ground to support the ladder legs while you climb up. Make sure that the angle of the ladder isn't too extreme.
- ▶ Do not use metal ladders near electrical sources.
- Face the ladder as you climb down, and also center your weight between the two sides.
- ▶ Don't reach out from the ladder. If you can't reach it from where you are at then climb down and move the ladder to where you need it.
- ▶ Remember to always tie off your ladder before climbing up. If you can't tie off to anything, then have someone spot the ladder for you.

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USDA releases \$15 million for **Conservation Innovation Grants**

On March 22, the U.S. Department of Agriculture released the interim final rule for Conservation Innovation Grants, announcing that \$15 million will be available to fund selected grant proposals. Farmers and ranchers will benefit by having new technologies to protect the environment and comply with federal, state, and local regulations.

Conservation Innovation Grant proposals will be accepted from eligible governmental or nongovernmental organizations and individuals for innovative single or multi-year projects involving producers who qualify for EQIP. The grants will fund projects targeting innovative onthe-ground conservation, including pilot projects and field demonstrations. Project proposals may address areas such as market-based pollution credit trading, agricultural conservation systems, carbon sequestration, and reduction of applied nutrients. Proposals must follow the format described in the RFP and be received in the NRCS National Office by May 28, 2004.

Selected applicants may receive grants up to 50% of the total project cost. Applicants must provide nonfederal matching funds for at least 50% of the project cost. An exception allows for beginning and limited resource farmers and ranchers, tribes, and community-based organizations representing these groups to obtain a higher percentage of project matching funds from in-kind contributions. The federal contribution may not exceed \$1 million for a single project. Additional information is available at http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/cig, your local NRCS or Conservation District office located in the county where you live.

The business meeting, services and songs are conducted in the Choctaw language. It is by consensus, once you enter the place of singing, only the Choctaw language is requested. Your church is welcome to participate with Choctaw hymns.



She was preceded in death by her husband, three brothers and three sisters.


